HOW MANY PEOPLE HAVE A HIDDEN DISABILITY IN THE UNITED KINGDOM (UK)?

- 1 in 5 people have a disability in the UK (13.9 million) - for example severe facial scarring or a skin disease.
- 80% of these have a hidden disability (over 11 million)
- 1.6 Million have a complex disability.

WHAT IS AN INVISIBLE DISABILITY?

 An invisible disability is classified as a physical, mental or neurological condition that is not visible from the outside, yet can limit or challenge a person's movements, senses or activities.

Everyone deserves to be treated with dignity and respect in their workplace and this especially applies to our colleagues that have hidden disabilities.

SOME EXAMPLES OF HIDDEN DISABILITIES

- Fibromyalgia
- ASD (Autism Spectrum Disorder)
- Brain injuries
- Diabetes
- Attention Deficit Hyperactive Disorder (ADHD)
- Depression
- Stammering (Unless you start to speak)
- Epilepsy
- Lupus
- Dyslexia
- Dyspraxia
- Dysgraphia

THE SUNFLOWER LANYARD

 You may see people walking around with a sunflower lanyard.
 This is designed to be a subtle way so other people can be aware that the person wearing the Sunflower lanyard will have a hidden disability.

AS A DISABLED PERSON WHAT AM I ENTITLED TO?

- Protection under the Equality Act 2010 or the Disability Discrimination Act 1995 (DDA) in Northern Ireland.
- The right not to be bullied in or outside of the workplace.
- Reasonable Adjustments under the Equality Act 2010 and the DDA.
- The ability to continue to work without the fear of facing disciplinary action at work.
- The freedom to go out in public and not be told that you don't look like a person with a disability.
- To feel that you will not face any action or treated differently by declaring your disability.

ACCESS TO WORK

- Access to Work applies to any paid job and this includes, parttime work, temporary work and work trials. Your employer cannot apply for you. You must apply for Access to Work yourself.
- If you believe you can benefit from an Access to Work application, we would encourage you to speak with your Regional Disability Lead.
- Examples of what may be funded include, specialist software, a support worker, adapted equipment or taxi journeys to and from work if you cannot use public transport.
- Depending on the size of your employer, Access to Work could refund up to 80% of approved costs under £10,000. It will normally pay any balance over £10,000 up to £65,180 per year.
